



Educational Requirements (GEX 2022) and Student Learning Outcomes for Credentials

Within the total number of credits necessary in order to obtain a Licensed Minister or Recognition of Ministry Credential as set out below, please note there are **2 required courses**. A full course is worth 3 credits.

Licensed Minister Credential - Theological Education:

90 credits of undergraduate study completed.

Required courses:

- A. **Pentecostal Theology of the Holy Spirit**
- B. **History of Pentecostalism (Canadian)**

Based upon three years of study required for either a bible college diploma (90 credit hours) or MDiv. or equivalent seminary degree (54 credit hours).

Recognition of Ministry Credential - Theological Education:

30 credits of accredited undergraduate or graduate theological education.

Required courses:

- A. **Pentecostal Theology of the Holy Spirit**
- B. **History of Pentecostalism (Canadian)**

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO) by category for credential education requirements:

Bible and Theology (BT)

1. Engage the biblical text through a broad knowledge of its metanarrative.
2. Demonstrate a trustworthy interpretation and application of the Bible.
3. Communicate faithful biblical messages that are effective for maturing others in the Christian life.
4. Describe what, why, and how the doctrine of our evangelical-Pentecostal tradition was formed.
5. Describe the significance of Spirit empowerment for developing mature disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ and the fulfillment of His mission at home and around the world.

6. Demonstrate the analytical and critical thinking skills required for the interaction between a biblical worldview and other ideologies.
7. Develop a broad understanding of human nature, society, and culture that informs ethical engagement.

8. Acquire relevant knowledge and employable skills for Christian ministry.
9. Form the character qualities required for building healthy communities, functional teams, and personal resilience.
